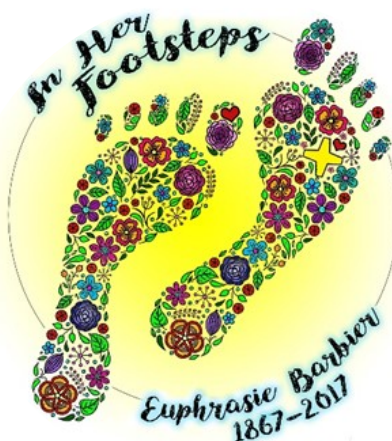

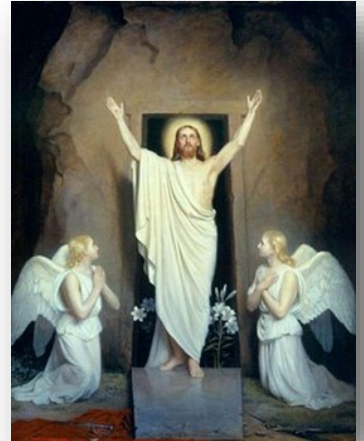

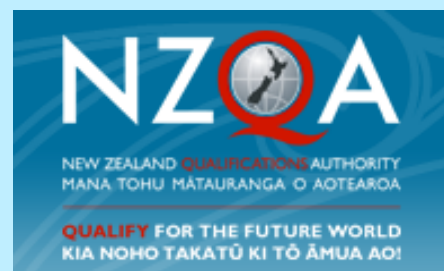
Academic News & E-Learning



Our e-learning plan for 2017 has been reviewed and the strategy going forward in 2017 is the increased engagement of e-learning as a tool for learning at all levels. At Sacred Heart College we promote blended learning which encompasses proven successful traditional methods and combines them with 21st century technology. E-learning enables collaboration, innovation, self-regulation and as part of a teaching programme, uses our students love of the electronic medium in a learning context. In order for this to be successful **we are beginning to strongly encourage students to have their own device** as the

pressure on shared resources is squeezed. A device guide is available on the e-learning page of our school website or available at the school office. To this end we have again entered into a collaboration with Noel Leeming who are prepared to offer a discount for BYOD devices if you tell the staff you are from Sacred Heart College. In addition, Noel Leeming offer a set-up session for students which is included in the price. They have a trained teacher who will help your daughter set up her device. Please remember as a Microsoft partnered school, every student is entitled to download Office (Word, Powerpoint, Excel, Onenote) free of charge by following the instructions on the e-learning page on our school website. We will be sharing more of this e-learning strategy in Term 2.

Senior students have had a busy few weeks with assessments at the end of a long term. As internal assessments are completed and marked students are able to log in to NZQA and see their official results on line. All Year 11s have now been given access and logged in. If your daughter was absent when this happened it is important she acquires her NSN number from her form teacher and gets a friend to walk her through the steps. All senior students should be checking their log in regularly.

Special Character

The Catholic Character Community are going on a Journey. This journey is based on being the hands and face of Christ to themselves and to others.

Each girl has been given a JOURNEY ticket. As they complete each spiritual step their ticket is clipped.

Once they have completed their journey they will receive a badge.

Each letter within the acronym represents an activity which has been designed to enhance their spiritual self-awareness and growth.

J – Jesus (undertake a sacramental journey or participate in Mass/liturgies)

O – Outreach – volunteer in the community OR raise funds for a charity of your choice.

U – Unite – coordinate fun activities for your sisters to participate in at school during Break 1 or Break 2.

R – Reconcile with the Lord OR go on a retreat/camp such as Jesus4real, lifeteen etc.

N – Nurture (each girl will be given a seed to nurture. As they take the time to look after the plant the aim is for them to see what their spirit also needs each day).

E – Essay or letter – the girls are encouraged to write an essay about how they think they are doing on their spiritual journey and where they would like it to go. At the end of the year the essay will be returned to them to see whether they have gone where they had hoped.

Another option is to write a letter to Bishop Charles to share their thoughts on the Church, if they have any questions or suggestions. There is a Synod in 2018 where the Bishops from around the world will meet with Pope Francis. The Pope has asked for all the youth of the world to share their joys, sorrows and hopes for the Church so their needs can be addressed.

Y – Youth – join a youth group/youth band or start a youth mission at school. The youth mission will be centred on bible study, praying the rosary or leading the liturgy of the word.

After completing this journey I hope students will see how much they can achieve when they step out in faith and celebrate the miracles that they are; to our school, our community and to the world.

Kia ora tātou,

Recently I was able to spend almost an entire week in Hawke's Bay.

I met with the Napier Parish Leadership Groups and staff, I made some home visits in the afternoons, prayed with Pā Felix Ngapere who has advanced Alzheimer's, enjoyed the hospitality of the Marists at Maryknoll and was even able to catch up with three former pupils whom I had taught in a former life!

Also during my stay I spent a morning at each of our three Colleges in the region: St Joseph's Māori Girls' College, Sacred Heart College, and St John's College.



These College visits were a great source of encouragement and uplift for me. I was very impressed with the quality of teaching in the Religious Education classes I visited and was equally impressed with the focus, respect, and depth of participation of the students. Among the topics being explored were parables and miracles, genetic engineering, euthanasia, the Blessed Trinity, ecology and discipleship. At St John's College I felt the Holy Spirit prompting me to make a diversion to the "culinary arts" department where I was able to sample an excellent quiche!

I encourage particularly parents of Year 6 and Year 8 students to explore the outstanding high school education (and intermediate at St Patrick's Napier) our Colleges offer families and whānau of the Bay. The academic results of these three Colleges are equal to or better than the state schools in the area. Their sporting and cultural opportunities similarly are plentiful and most importantly the faith and values formation that our Colleges offer mean that your children or mokopuna are shaped for life. Nothing can substitute the value of that. While all else fades, faith endures to the day of our death. I was reminded of that vividly when Fr Vince and I were with Fr Felix. To us it seemed like he had understood nothing of our words but when I gave him a blessing in te reo Māori ...kia whakapaingia koutou ... he understood and summonsed the strength to make the sign of the cross. It was a very moving moment for Vince and I.

Thanks to parents and caregivers for what you do for your tamariki. As the wondrous celebrations of Easter draw near, may you be greatly blessed.

Pastoral Matters



Winter Uniform – from the start of Term 2 all students are to be in full Winter uniform. The requirements are outlined on page 3 of the girls' diaries. Girls must wear either black pantihose or knee-length plain black socks with their black shoes. The school tie must also be worn by all

students. Please check the length of your daughter's skirt and ensure that it is of regulation length. The only jackets which are permitted with school uniform are the school windbreaker or a plain black jacket; no other mufti jackets are to be worn. Your support over all things uniform is always appreciated by the school. If any family is having financial challenges in providing the correct items, please do not hesitate to contact either myself or your daughter's Dean.

Attendance - after nine weeks of school we have 213 students (75%) achieving our school-wide goal of attaining 90% attendance. Please remember – great attendance leads to great results! Each term we celebrate and congratulate those students who have achieved 100% attendance and at this stage of the term, 41 girls are on track for this recognition.

You would have received your daughter's attendance on her interim report and I understand that some families were concerned about these figures. The half days calculated should be accurate and reflect your daughter's attendance either at school or on a school-related event (e.g Year 9 camp, Athletic Sports etc.) However, the attendance for each subject was misleading in some cases. If some year levels are at school whilst other levels are on a school event, we require a timetable for the entire school. This is why a student may have had no half day absences reported, yet it looks like she has missed some lessons in each of her subject classes. For senior students, the number of classes a student misses may give a more accurate picture. Whilst a student may be on legitimate "school" business, it will highlight the number of lessons she has actually missed for a particular subject which could certainly be an issue. I hope this clarifies the situation for families but if not, please discuss it with your daughter or contact me if you have any further questions.

HEARTS Programme

Hearts making Hearts—For the Visual Art programme the girls were shown an artist called Jim Dine who was an American Pop Artist who created heart based paintings. The girls were required in teams of 3 or 4 to look at an artwork and analyse it – what makes this artwork the way it is? What could be the meaning behind it? What is Pop Art? They then completed a mixed media painting on a canvas, using similar techniques which they took home. The girls all had lots of fun and experienced many challenges both in thinking about art and in using the techniques for painting that were different and unexpected.



We had a wonderful group of enthusiastic Year 8's participating in our Textiles programme. They were to design and make a pillow using pre-cut fabrics and applique details. Students learnt how to applique an initial or image onto their pillow and then sew it together using basic machine skills to complete an outcome. Pillows were supplied to plump up the covers for instant gratification. All students completed their projects and were keen to try out more ideas at home.

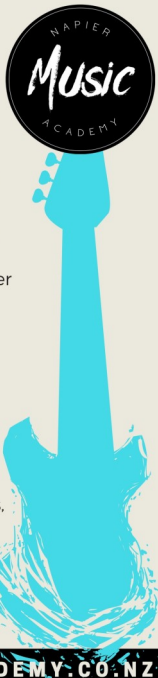

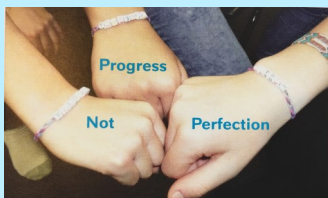

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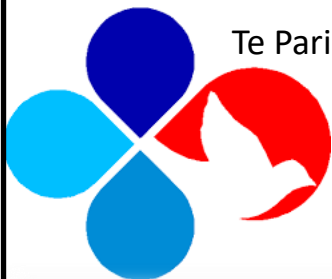
